# The Issues We Address



#### **Plastic Reduction**

Reducing the impact of plastics in the marine environments that surround us by advocating for a decrease in plastic consumption.



#### **Beach Access**

Working with decision-makers to overcome restrictions and ensure full and fair beach access for all to enjoy.



#### **Ocean Protection**

Defending our oceans from challenges threatening the vitality of the ecosystem, such as spills from container ships.



#### **Coastal Preservation**

Taking on issues that threaten our beaches and natural shorelines, such as appropriate setbacks for development.



#### **Clean Water**

Finding solutions that restore healthy watersheds, protect local water supplies and keep pollution from reaching the ocean



#### Currently, Surfrider has three Chapters and two clubs in Canada



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#### **Pacific Rim**

Based in Tofino and Ucluelet, Pacific Rim Chapter has become one of the most effective chapters in the entire network, implementing bans on plastic drinking straws and single-use plastic shopping bags

#### Vancouver Island

Based in Victoria, the Vancouver Island chapter has spearheaded a long running remote beach cleanup program and worked to implement the first single-use plastic shopping bag ban in the City of Victoria.

#### Vancouver

The Vancouver chapter has been the longest running chapter in B.C. and was instrumental in advocating for a federal ban on microbeads.





#### Active in the Community

Through its grassroot programs and campaigns, Surfrider volunteers are present in the community, engaging with a wide variety of individuals and stakeholders.

Surfrider is a strong outlet for volunteers that want to have a role in protecting the marine environment, providing a wide variety of options for advocacy.

## Surfrider Creates Coastal Victories

#### **Banning Plastics**

Surfrider chapters campaigned for Victoria to become first city in B.C. to ban single-use plastic bags and for Tofino and Ucluelet to become first municipalities in B.C. to ban plastic straws.

#### **Managing Cigarette Butt Litter**

In collaboration with the City of Victoria, implemented the 1st cigarette butt collection and recycling program on Vancouver Island, resulting in millions of butts being recycled instead of ending up in the waterways.

#### **Treating Sewage**

Advocacy toward getting sewage treatment in Victoria occurred for decades. Surfrider collaborated with several other organizations in the community to make this happen.

# Taking our advocacy to the next level

The issues we focus on are growing and evolving. We need to keep pace with them.



#### **Marine Debris**

Government is starting to take steps to address this at a large scale. But so much more can be done to improve pollution prevention and enhance cleanup activity.



#### Single-use Plastics

The scale of interventions aimed at reducing single-use plastics has grown beyond the local level. Surfrider has a key voice in ensuring that any new policies are as effective as possible.



#### **Maritime Safety**

Spills in the marine environment threaten ecosystems and affect broad geographies.

Navigating this complex regulatory environment to ensure impacts are mitigated requires specialized expertise.

Single-use plastic policies that have been introduced in B.C. and Canada have helped reduce plastic pollution. But the major impact of plastic on shorelines comes from other sources.












## The Data is Telling an Important Story

Early reports from several cleanup projects supported by the provincially funded Clean Coast Clean Waters shoreline cleanup program shows **abandoned**, **lost or discarded fishing gear (ALDFG)** is THE major source of plastic pollution on the coast of B.C.








### Containers Spills Wreak Havoc on the Coast
